## RATTON IN THE JUNGLE

The Jungle migrant camp in Calais is currently home to almost 6,000 men, women and children. They live amongst the sand dunes on a narrow strip of land between the main coast road and the sea. It is a place of deprivation; a cross between the last days of a Glastonbury Festival camp site and an African style shanty town. It has its shops, cafes, mosques and churches, made from builders' pallets, plastic and corrugated metals and there are tents in their thousands disappearing to the horizon. Surprisingly, considering its disparate nature - 12 different nationalities and counting - it has a pervading sense of calm. This has not been arrived at by accident. Its residents, some with complicated histories, have worked hard to ensure that national rivalries are laid to rest. "After all," one Sudanese gentleman told me, "we have come from death and persecution, if this place is nothing else; it has to be a place of peace."




Nevertheless, life is hard. 30 toilets and 5 water outlets serve a camp of 6,000 people. The weather is closing in, people are wet, ill and many are suffering psychologically. So, when students from an English comprehensive school decide to reach out to these people, it matters. The same Sudanese gentleman told me that most of the time he feels his humanity is slipping away, but such acts of kindness from complete strangers restore his sense of dignity.

On behalf of Ratton Interactors, who organised the response, and the migrants of Calais, I would like to thank all students and parents for their kind contributions to the hygiene packs. We collected 120 full packs in all and sent out 12 boxes to the camp. Donations that arrived after the deadline have been collected and will be donated to Matthew 25 Mission for their work with the homeless and vulnerable groups in Eastbourne.

Each day at lunchtime students from all years 'drop-in' to try out ideas and to dance with friends - **Molly Browning** of Year 8 is one such student whose views on Dance can be read below.

*"I started dancing when I was 7 at Little Gems Dance Academy and have taken many exams in Freestyle, Rock n roll, Ballet, Tap, Modern and Theatre Craft. Each time I pass an exam I receive a medal and now I have a big collection! I always look forward to dance lessons because although they are sometimes hard they are always fun and I absolutely LOVE dancing! Taking part in the Eastbourne Music and Arts Festival at the Winter Gardens is something I have done now on three occasions and although some people feel nervous about performing to a big audience I just enjoy it and feel happy to be up on stage! I love dance lessons at school and go up to the Dance studios most days at lunchtime too. Future plans include taking part in school shows and doing GCSE Dance when I am older".*
