Celebrating Science at Ratton!

Year 8 Forensics Day

On the 7th March all year 8 students spent a day as forensic scientists. Students had to find out who robbed a local bank (theoretically) by participating in and analysing a wide range of experiments and collecting evidence. Students had to select the correct criminal from 30 suspects and use the evidence to complete a booklet detailing their findings. The activities raised awareness of the various skills needed to be a forensic scientist, as well as promoting the different aspects of science and how they can be used. They also were shown how some of the more complicated skills in the new GCSE are applied in interesting real life situations.

Students visited four laboratories during the day including the hair and pollen and fibre lab, chromatography lab, ion testing lab and fingerprint testing lab. Students completed a wide variety of practicals including examined slides of different fabric fibres, testing soil for pH, collecting fingerprints and chemical tests to identify chemicals left at the crime scene.

Students thoroughly enjoyed the day, and learnt a great deal about how forensic science has progressed and contributed to reducing crime in the UK. At the end the day, the team which collected the most accurate evidence won amazon vouchers.

As one of the most popular areas in science, this was a great way to engage year 7 students in their learning of science and ensure they make the best possible start to their GCSEs'. Students were really excited throughout the day and said that they really enjoyed the experience and learnt a lot.

It was then lunch time and **Ratton Girls Can** helped in the lunch hall, making sure the reception children could eat their hot nutritious dinners and provided the Motcombe students with their drinks. Having finished eating and tidying the hall we then went into the playground and had a great time, playing games and engaging with the smaller children.



The afternoon was spent outside with the reception students, where they were learning through play. The **Ratton Girls Can** spent an enjoyable time building dens, gardening, doing role play and reading in the sunshine.

We had a great day and really enjoyed the time learning about working with young children and the different job roles that staff in an infant school do.

Drusillas take people from the age of 16 to work, they advertise on their website for vacancies for full-time, part-time, week-end and holiday positions. We found out that there is a simple application form to fill in and then they have a group interview where you work in a team and do a task, the staff at Drusillas look for people with good communication skills and that are able to work as a team and be kind and helpful to their customers. The next round of recruitment is in April so if you are looking to work in the summer please look at the Drusillas website!

Drusillas also invest in their staff and if you are keen and motivated they will promote from within, we met Hayley who had started at 16 and was now being trained to work in the education department, they are happy to train their staff in a variety of skills. We also met Jamie who had joined on a weekend job and was now in charge of first aid, managing the rides and staff and looking after the welfare of the visitors.

After learning about job roles we were able to see and hold Roland the snake, Oleg the meerkat, John the chinchilla, Bernard the bearded dragon as well as the hissing cockroaches.

We then spent some time exploring the park, looking at the animals and testing out the ride.

I am always surprised by how quickly GCSE exams season comes about. I am now busy preparing my 14th cohort of GCSE students for their final few months at Ratton and I am so proud of them.

Each year group has its own character and this year's year 11 have impressed me with their desire to succeed, their resilience and their humour. My three Year 11 classes always brighten my day with their good natured jokes and willingness to work with me. Often when we are stressed our sense of humour suffers so it is great to see a group of young people and teachers making each other laugh.

As we get into the final few weeks before the exams tension does mount, so to help them over the final hurdles we will be running a series of workshops to remind them of the importance of rest, exercise and good nutrition during this time. A big help is if they can come up with a revision timetable that parents can see so that you can help them stay on task and maybe even build in some fun events as treats for good work. If they do not know how to do this they should ask their tutor who can give them some pointers.

When we think about our wellbeing it is always about balancing the different aspects of our life, we as adults know the difference between we things we **have** to do and things we **want** to do. We are more able than our young people to prioritise tasks and make responsible decisions, so our young people may need a bit of help prioritising rest over gaming, or revising over the gym but they will see the benefits of it come August on results day.

There is a great deal of support available if they need it, there is homework club every day for revision support. There is an Assistant Head of Community for all 5 communities or their Tutor who will be available for pastoral support and there is great online support at www.e-motion.org.uk.

For three nights between 19th and the 21st of March a seventy strong cast took to the The Royal Hippodrome stage to perform Little Shop of Horrors – a musical homage to the 1950's B-Movie of plant-based massacre and world domination! Directed by Neil Stocker, choreographed by Chloe Papagna (and Producer) Vikki Potten and Musical Director Ryan Kearsey.

Sophie Deville and Ted Brickley stole the show as the unlikely couple of Seymour and Audrey who bring the run down florists on Skid Row, where they work, owned by the grumpy (yet strangely agile in a tango!) Mushnick played by Luke Corteling-
Rice to world fame by the cultivation of the flesh eating Audrey 2 voiced brilliantly



by Billy Smith.

Seymour leaves, pun intended, a trail of

bloody destruction to feed his plant including Audrey's abusive dentist boyfriend Orin, played by Elvis impersonator Leon Robinson with real flair and menace. Eventually the plant grows to an enormous size after being fed Mushnick, Orin and a martyred Audrey. It then gets itself

seeded across the USA to eat all humanity. This story is narrated by a gospel chorus of six 'Shoo Wop' girls who just happen to be hanging around the shop. On stage for most of the play the 'Shoo Wops' commentate and demonstrate with the audience and those on stage telling the audience what to think about the action superbly performed by the pitch perfect Ella Higgins, Anais Deedigan, Sophie Cosham, Grace Beeney, Megan Archer and Katie Laing.

Well done to Kaleb Berhane (that is a strange and interesting plant!), Eva Bell, Thailia Wilkinson, Brooke Farmer, Tiane Mole and Sasha Mansbridge for their excellent supporting roles through the play and especially in one of Act Two's big numbers 'The Meek Shall Inherit The Earth'.

Of course we would have had no show at all without our amazing and dedicated chorus who worked tirelessly to remember their dance moves and songs making sure that they did everything in the right place at the right time. The chorus was built by members of all years at Ratton seven through ten. You in the fabulous chorus we salute you and can see stars of the future twinkling!!

The cast were joined on stage by four different puppets of the plant at various stages of growth supplied along with the full set, and props by Accord Stage Works. Vikki Potten had her hand up the first of these monsters and was also manipulating the huge human swallowing final puppet that also had Zephan Robinson and Will Brook as its grabbing tendrils underneath wrapped in camouflage. Will was also inside the Audrey that sang and ate its way into the first Act snapping at the chopped



up limbs of Orin the Dentist.

The show was driven by the accomplished staff and student band led by Ryan Kearsley in the pit. Special mention to Eion Bevens and Caleb Scott in Year 10 on drums and trumpet respectively who made

the house rock with Nikki Grover on flute and Simon Potter on bass – as well as trainee teacher Ellen Oxenham tinkling the ivories! A musical lives or dies by the music and we all wanted the band to keep playing.

The teachers would like to thank all parents and carers for their support during the long rehearsal process that started last Summer and took many, many weekends to make happen. Thank you for making sure they were on time but also for helping them with their music and their lines.

Supporting our first venture to The Royal Hippodrome were Managing Director and ex-Ratton pupil Alex Adams and we would like to officially thank him and his team for working with us to create this event of a lifetime for our students. There are many links with Ratton and The Royal Hippodrome including Technical Director Stuart French, whose daughter Chloe, also used to go to Ratton and now is working in the industry.

We hope that this will herald the start of a long collaboration with the Royal Hippodrome giving our students opportunities to be a part of a professional show in an historic and important theatre that is undergoing huge renovations to bring it back to its former glory.

Ratton has a long tradition of quality performances, which stems from its status as a Performing Arts School, across music, dance and drama and is fully committed to ensuring that students have opportunities that are both inspiring and may lead to many thinking about careers in the creative industry.




