RESEARCH

In school: You will learn to carry out research using "research instruments" including surveys and interviews, and by analysing data others have already collected ("secondary data"). You will learn the difference between qualitative and quantitative data, as well as structured, semi-structured and...

COMMUNICATION



In school: You will articulate what you have learnt through your primary and secondary research through essays, presentations, debates and discussions. You will also listen to the views and findings of your classmates and teachers, and reflect on how their ideas might fit in with or modify...

ANALYSIS



In school: You will analyse the data, theories and concepts found in past research – as well as your own. You will develop your own critical methodology and work systematically to resolve conflicting findings, select relevant data and modify your conclusions based on the evidence.

TEAMWORK



In school: Sociology is a social subject! You will collaborate with others on joint projects but you will also present to your peers and listen to their own findings in ways which will influence your own approach and ideas. Such teamworking relies on a flexible and openminded attitude and a willingness...



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In school: You will learn how societal norms influence how people communicate and interact with others. This will help you appreciate why other societies have different rules to your own, and why various cultural groups within society may find different things...

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Careers in Health and Social

Health and social care is a vast service sector undergoing rapid change, with new government initiatives giving it a higher profile than ever. These developments mean there is likely to be a demand for well-trained, multi-skilled people. However, given the cutbacks in public sector funding, the NHS and the social care sector are being forced to face new challenges and to make enormous efficiency savings, which is likely to affect both patterns of working and staff recruitment.

Many services are changing radically or will cease to exist; new partnerships and fresh allegiances are being formed, all of which will have an impact on those in the public sector. It is likely that the private and not-for-profit sectors will play an increasing role in delivering health services thus increasing the range of employers in the sector.

New career pathways are opening up in which employees are increasingly taking on new and demanding roles in environments that are continually changing.

Typical employers Many health studies graduates work in the public sector for:

- There are a range of opportunities in the private sector, working, for example, in private healthcare organisations as a lifestyle consultant or working in alternative medicine and therapies. Many of these options involve being self-employed.

Skills for your CV

A degree in health studies covers health in its broad context and investigates contemporary health issues. It gives you an in-depth understanding of health and healthcare and you learn to:

- research, analyse and evaluate health and health-related issues from a multidisciplinary standpoint
- use health information and data effectively
- understand and formulate health-related arguments and contest theories.
- You also develop a range of general skills, including:
- written and oral communication
- the ability to work both independently and in a team
- effective problem-solving and time management
- report writing
- research and data analysis

Further study and University

For many health-related careers, for example nursing, speech and language therapy, social work, physiotherapy and occupational therapy, you'll need to take a specific degree or higher qualification. You may have to complete a full vocational course from the beginning or there may be a shortened postgraduate option for health studies graduates.

It's also possible to take a postgraduate certificate, diploma or Masters in health studies or a related area such as public health or leadership in health and social care.

Apprenticeships in Health and Social Care

It takes more than doctors to keep our frontline health services running efficiently with health and wellbeing apprenticeships

Whether you're treating patients or conducting research, working in healthcare means you'll be making a difference to the lives of others. Healthcare is one of the largest employment sectors in the UK, dependent on the experts who provide frontline care in hospitals, homes and surgeries. Without their commitment, dedication and professionalism, many lives would be much worse, and maybe even lost.

The complexity of the task at hand remains constant, from caring for people with physical, practical, social, emotional or intellectual challenges, to helping bring a new life into the world, or save another life from ending.

The NHS and other service providers need highly skilled professionals to undertake these and a range of other tasks, at a time when people are living longer and health budgets are being squeezed. Health and wellbeing apprenticeships reflect the need for professionals from the top down, with a particular emphasis on adult and childcare and support, nursing, paramedic and ambulance services, and rehabilitation.

Expect no days to be the same as you work to make a positive change to the health and wellbeing of the vulnerable.

There are a range of health and wellbeing apprenticeships on offer in this sector as it takes more than doctors to keep our health services running, you could be dispensing medicines, performing an eye test or working as a dental nurse.

Ambulance support workers are needed to transport individuals to and from specified treatment centres and other locations. Children, young people and families managers are also needed to build teams, manage resources and lead new approaches to working practices that deliver improved outcomes and put the child, young person or family at the centre of social care practice.
